Arctic Spirit: Inuit Art from the Albrecht Collection at the Heard Museum

Presenter: Curator of the collection and this exhibition, Ingo Hessel, who is the Albrecht Adjunct Curator of Inuit Art at the Heard Museum in Phoenix.

Description: The objects in the exhibition span 2,250 years of artistic creativity, from 250 BC to the 21st century. Popular subjects in Inuit art traditionally are family scenes, animals, legends, and the Inuit relationship with the Arctic environment. The exhibition includes wall hangings, prints, drawings, sculptures, carved ivories, and decorated clothing. Maps, text panels, and photographs of the land and artists provide contextual information for the objects. The curator of the
